

The plan is to erect the tower on Tuesday at 5pm weather permitting. The secretary will send a note to the membership asking for volunteers.

ARRL Affiliation:

The necessary paper work has been submitted and we are waiting final approval.

New Business:

2 Meter Repeater:

John Wright reported that due to a donation from the Egypt Fire Department we now have 2 General Electric Proline transceivers suitable for use as a repeater. At this time one has been tested and found to fully operational. We have manuals for most of the modules in these two radios. Dave Sweet indicated that John Pelton(sp?) has experience with these radios, and may be willing to help. Gil Porter of WRC, who was up to recently a GE employee, will try to gather further information from contacts he still maintains within GE. Ray Crandall has volunteered to investigate methods to tap the company for funds and author the required paperwork. The details of the final configuration are undecided with regards to linking and location and features. Any suggestions and offers of help are appreciated. The first attempt will be at a basic "no frills" repeater.

John requested three things from the club:

- 1- Support, do we want a 2 Meter repeater?
- 2- Seed money, needed for any repairs, new crystals and odds & ends. He requests \$100.00
- 3- Duplexors at a cost of \$500.00

A motion was made and seconded that the club support the idea of a 2 Meter repeater. The motion was approved.

A motion was made and seconded that the club provide up to \$100.00 in seed money to get the project started. The motion was approved.

All agreed that an alternative method of financing duplexors was needed and will be addressed by the people working on the repeater.
