



Ramblings from the Secretary

Since we don't have a Karz's Korner this month your stuck with me.

The thought of the upcoming elections this month caused me to think back on my short ham career and involvement in the **XARC**. When several of us were asked if we wanted to take the novice class offered by the club it awakened some old dreams and nightmares (Morse code). I kind of wanted to be a ham as kid of 10 or so when a neighbor of ours decided to become a ham as a retirement hobby. I was curious about the activity that was a tower and antenna erection party.(some form of male bonding no After seeing his "shack" (a corner of the breakfast nook) and hearing him talk to people from around the world I was hooked. There was only

one problem, there was no such thing as a radio class and he didn't feel qualified to act as an "Elmer". I had an ARRL handbook (new cost \$3.50) but it might as well been written in Greek(come to think of it some of it was). Anyway the interest got tucked away for future action. Years later found me in the Army, standing in a MARS station in Germany, listening to a PFC explain to me that I couldn't place a call home because all the radios were broken and nobody knew how to fix them. 8 years of electronics tinkering and repair plus a college degree in electronics had finally found a practical application so I said "mind if I take a look at them?" problems were simple to repair and we got the station on the air and I was invited to "come back anytime". I spent a lot of time there and my interest in amateur radio was rekindled. I got lots of time to learn about the equipment (Collins KWM-2A, 30L1 and 30S1) and antennas (beams, dipoles, rhombics and log periodics). I even built a Heathkit SB310 receiver and a SB102 transceiver which I still use today. The station trustee acted as my "Elmer" and began teaching me the code. I was set to take a Conditional test when the trustee was transferred home. Shortly after that I returned to civilian life and started a family bought a house etc. Several times later John Wright and I started to learn the code with the help of Gene Parker but for one reason or another we both drifted away from it. brings me to the day mentioned in the beginning of these ramblings. I guess the pressure of the classroom setting coupled with the peer pressure of having so many friends in the class I couldn't drift away again. Happily my friends and I passed and went on to more advanced licenses. Our interests in the hobby are diverse but we are all hams and are enjoying the hobby. Last year I experienced what I consider to be the high point of my ham career(short as it's been). I had the pleasure and terror of teaching a novice class with Fred Miller. Watching the people as you tell them that they passed and experiencing their excitement has to be the high point of a hams career. What a nice feeling to carry around inside.

Well enough about me, but I would like to thank all the people who have helped me along the way and a special thanks to Mr Zimmerman my neighbor who kindled the spark so many years ago.

This was an abbreviated meeting so committee reports were not presented.

Pete announced that due to other commitments he would resign as repeater trustee, and recommended that John assume his duties.

Lou Kohnen requested that we purchase new call books after some discussion in was decided to table this item for now.

Rick has ordered the materials for the Novice and Tech/General class.

Bob put in a request for hams to help with the Webster H.S. band.

John reported on 2 meter repeater status. He is recommending we purchase 4 element dipole arrays for the 2meter and 70cm repeater. He proposes that we allocate \$300 for the installation of the 2 meter repeater and upgrade of the 70cm antennas. It was also proposed that any funds remaining from the \$300 and the \$50 left in the 2 meter allocation be rolled in the the savings account to enhance a combined repeater disaster fund. The motion was moved and seconded and passed.

Barry reported that he would like a QSL card from each club member. He reported that the linear was operational. As librarian he requests articles and manuals to add to the club library. A weblos den would like to tour the station November 1st and receive a talk about amateur radio. Correspondence with the author of the logging program used on fieldday provided the requested changes to the program. Barry requests that we become a registered user at a cost of \$25. The motion was seconded and passed.

Barry requested \$240 as front money for the 6 meter amp. project with \$160 returned to the treasury and \$80 being the clubs cost for its amp. The motion was seconded and passed.

Bob made a motion that we build a keyer for members to use while operating the club station. It was requested that we purchase a paddle set (NTE\$50) and that Bob would build the keyer. Seconded and passed.
